SYNOPSIS

There are many divided cities in these United States of America.

Divided by geography, divided by economics, and divided by a political history that most are afraid to acknowledge.

It is not easy to explain to children why the US government once subsidized housing on the basis of race. It is not easy to explain why this country locks up so many people. Or why sentences for non-violent drug offenders would ever exceed those of violent criminals.

More difficult than explaining these issues to our children - or ourselves - is confronting the ugly fact that our country has <u>never</u> resolved these problems.

DEFORCE is a chronicle of one city's long struggle with political oppression.

Once the engine of America, Detroit remains a proud city - rich with local triumphs and individual achievements, but known best for its overwhelming quality of life challenges.

This film reveals that these present challenges are indeed forged of the past. If nothing changes in our cities, they will shape this country's future in ways that benefit no one.

Dr. Bergmann is Director of Recovery Systems at New York's **Department of Health**. He was formerly Research Director at the **Detroit Department of Health and Wellness Promotion** and a faculty associate of the **University of Michigan**.

He is the author of <u>Getting Ghost: Two Young Lives and</u> the Struggle for the Soul of an American City, which he wrote and researched in Detroit, while a postdoctoral fellow with the **UC Berkeley School of Public Health**.

Elrick and Schaefer recently published a book about the former-mayor entitled, The Kwame Sutra: Musings on lust, life and leadership, from Detroit Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick.

Dr. Farley is Research Professor Emeritus, with **University of Michigan's Population Studies Center** and Professor Emeritus of Sociology. His research interests concern population trends in the United States, focusing on racial differences, ethnicity, and urban structure.

He is Author, Co-Author, and editor of over half a dozen books, including <u>Detroit Divided</u> (2000),

Blacks and Whites: Narrowing the Gap? (1999) The New American Reality: Who We Are, How We Got Here, Where We Are Going (1998) amongst numerous research studies.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS - FAQS

What does the word "Deforce" mean?

To take away or to hold property from its rightful owner by force.

Why should people that don't live in Detroit care about the City's history?

Because the extremes of its experience make the challenges America faces today far more clear.

Following World War II, Detroit's was America's most industrialized, modernized city- a truly global leader in the new age of military-industrial economics. Popular media tends to focus on the national and global benefits of the era that followed, but viewers of Deforce will better grasp the underreported local costs.

The Film features many remarkable statistics, which struck you the most upon encountering?

Learning that Detroit had 5x the number of murders as people that died in Northern Ireland's well publicized Civil War over that the same period was a real eye-opener.

Are you concerned that this film will be negative publicity for a city that's trying to change its image?

You can't fight a problem until you understand its roots. Over the past four-decades, there has been no shortage of money and effort spent on improving the city's image. Detroit has many problems, but all are exacerbated by a lack of trust and understanding and the only cure for that is honesty.

What inspired you to make this film?

Growing up in the area, we had long been aware of just how disengaged most metro-Detroiters were from City issues. While Detroit's problems grab a lot of headlines, we saw no effort from the media to educate the wider population as to their historical origins, so we decided to make an effort.
